(Fun Fact: did you know that the white 'stringy' bits that you often see when cracking an egg, are called chalaza and are what anchor the yolk in place when the egg is whole?)

After judiciously watching over their eggs for almost 3 school weeks, the fateful day arrived and 10 tiny chicks hatched on Sunday 26th / Monday 27th June. Deer Class have been wonderful parents, carefully watching over their brood and marvelling at the speed at which they grow. Our fluffy friends will be leaving us at the end of term to join a local flock but will hopefully visit us again at some point next year.













Chelsea Flower Show in Year 3

Our learning outcome this term has been to transform our Year 3 outdoor space into a garden inspired by the Chelsea Flower Show. Our aim was to create a gorgeous space that is colourful, relaxing and good for birds, bees and butterflies.

We have seen so much wildlife in the garden including lots of butterflies and hidden underneath the logs have been lots of different insects that the children have enjoyed discovering and identifying. The children have been amazed by how tall our sunflowers are, some are now up to 5ft tall, our dahlias are growing buds (one has actually flowered) and hopefully more will flower before end of term and this is also the case with our cosmos. All of these plants were grown from seed so it's been wonderful for the children to obverse how the flowers have grown.

Sadly the open garden afternoon wasn't able to happen, but here are a selection of photos to show you how great the garden is looking.




Year 1
